

## LUMBER BUILDS COMMUNITIES

Through the Sierra Pacific Foundation's commitment to growing healthy communities, there are many opportunities to support non-profit organizations doing great work.

One such group is Home For Our Troops (HFOT). HFOT's tagline is "Building Homes, Rebuilding Lives." Their mission is to build and donate specially-adapted custom homes nationwide for severely injured post-9/11 veterans, enabling



them to rebuild their lives. Started in Massachusetts, this year marks HFOT's 15th anniversary. Since 2004, HFOT has built over 270 speciallyadapted homes. The Sierra Pacific Foundation has supported two projects in Washington state in the past year.

Built with lumber manufactured by SPI Aberdeen, Centralia, and Shelton along with window packages produced by Sierra Pacific Windows, two veterans are receiving keys to their new homes - one more step on the journey of rebuilding their lives.

Marine SGT Milan Franklin and Army SGT Jereme Sawyer (pictured left) have both sacrificed so much. It is an honor and privilege to be able to support HFOT's mission in providing specially adapted homes for these two heroes. SGT Sawyer explains, "I am grateful and feel very blessed to be receiving this home. It means a lot more independence for me and will allow me to take my life back. Homes For Our Troops is a second chance, this would be a chance for me to start my life."

## WHAT'S HOT IN WINDOW & DOOR TRENDS

#### **Contemporary designs focusing on more light, less window, bold colors & a clean, squared line** by Penny Goodpaster (Retired); excerpt from **Colorado Homes Magazine**

Contemporary home design is a strong preference among homeowners these days, and for good reason. The style is light, bright and open, encouraging seamless transitions between living spaces both inside and out.

Here are three window and door trends bringing light and life to contemporary homes:

1. Large and in charge: Huge expanses of floor-to-ceiling glass are often the starting point in contemporary home style, capitalizing on unobstructed views and natural light. Among the hottest trends are entire window-walls that extend

interior living spaces to outdoor retreats - by way of massive bi-fold, multi-slide, and lift-and-slide systems.

2. The straight and narrow: Think "more light, less window." Among the contemporary style musthaves: straight lines, narrow stiles, rails and sashes, fixed windows with narrow frames, corner beads, and squared lines of window and door profiles, grilles and hardware.

3. Black is back: The contemporary movement has brought bold features into the mix when it comes to windows and door design. Black interiors and exteriors, as well as black-on-black hardware, are the biggest trends so far. The result is a stunning statement for any contemporary home design.

## PRESCRIPTION FAU



How do your prescription drug benefits work?

 Use your CareMark discount card at the pharmacy when purchasing your prescription medications.
Write your CareMark discount card ID number on the prescription receipt and send it to Health Benefits.
Once you have met your deductible, reimbursement for covered medications is 80% for generic drugs and 60% for brand name drugs.

Yes. Prescription benefits are limited to innetwork services only.

Can I use another discount program such as GoodRx© in addition to my CareMark discount card?

Yes. After the pharmacy runs your prescription through CareMark, if you have another discount card that provides a greater discount to you, the pharmacy will sell you the medication at the lowest of the two prices. You can then turn in your prescription receipt for reimbursement.

## **SUPPORTING ADVANCES IN TECHNOLOGY**

In October 2015, the Sierra Pacific Foundation committed \$6 million to the College of Forestry at Oregon State University to support construction of an advanced wood products laboratory. The A.A. "Red" Emmerson Advanced Wood Products Laboratory is a world-class timber engineering facility dedicated to furthering research, innovation and collaboration across the timber design, engineering, fabrication and construction sector.

The Emmerson family attended the dedication of the completed lab in May 2019. "We are extremely pleased to be associated with OSU's Advanced Wood Products Laboratory," George Emmerson said. "Sierra Pacific Industries has grown dramatically in the past 25 years, and we attribute much of that growth to a belief that advanced mill technology is an essential element of maintaining a competitive edge in the wood products industry."



The laboratory houses two distinct technical functions:

- A **structural testing bay**, complete with a 25' tall, 4' thick reaction wall capable of testing the strength and integrity of structures up to three stories high and a 60' x 80' strong floor.
- An advanced wood products manufacturing bay, currently being outfitted with state-of-theart fabrication equipment, including a cross laminated timber (CLT) press, a 5-axis CNC, and a high-accuracy robot mounted on a linear track system.

"Wood has become the building product of choice... no other material can match it for sustainability and renewability," Mark Emmerson added. "Success requires constant innovation."

## **FOUNDATION GRANTS \$649,000**

#### 2019-2020 Scholarship Recipients Announced

The Sierra Pacific Foundation has awarded \$649,000 to 209 students as they attend colleges, universities, and trade schools during the 2019-2020 school year.

For 40 years, the Foundation has been granting scholarships to dependent children of Sierra Pacific crew members. Qualified recipients are eligible for the scholarship for four years. Sometimes recipients are granted a fifth year based on their school and finalizing their undergraduate degree or trade school program.

outstanding young people pursue their dreams, we are investing in the future and in the generations to come," said Carolyn Emmerson Dietz, Foundation President. "We look forward to the next 40 years."

## **SPOTLIGHT ON SUCCESS: CHASING DREAMS**

Inspiration comes in many forms. Sometimes a person's sheer tenacity is inspiring. Perhaps inspiration is delivered by way of an individual's natural talent and potential being realized. Inspiration may be shared through the hard work and commitment of a fellow team member. Meet loelu "Jo Jo" Levao. Jo Jo embodies all these traits. In this issue of BoardTalk, he shares his SPI story.

In 1998, Jo Jo moved his family to the United States. Ultimately ending up in Susanville, CA, Jo Jo began looking for a job. His fatherin-law suggested he try to find work at Sierra Pacific. Jo Jo applied for a clean-up position and did not get an interview. But Jo Jo did not give up. He applied a second time resulting in an interview. "The only question I was asked in the interview was: Do you know how to use a shovel?" Jo Jo recalls. He had been working on a fishing boat in Samoa prior to coming to the States and while he had no specific mill experience, he could weld and use a torch and, most importantly, he really wanted to work and he definitely knew how to use a shovel.

For 10 months, Jo Jo worked clean-up at SPI Susanville. It didn't take him long to figure out he really wanted to become a millwright. "I took advantage of every opportunity to work clean-up near the millwrights," he explains. He talked with his supervisors and managers and let them know he'd like to learn the skills needed to become a millwright. Jo Jo feels that he earned the opportunity to work with the millwrights because he worked hard and was always looking for ways to make himself useful to the crew. One day, a job bid went up for a millwright trainee and Jo Jo submitted his bid sheet. He was awarded the trainee position and he began learning the trade.

Just one week after being put in the trainee slot, a night shift whistle chaser wanted to move down as a helper on days so Jo Jo quickly was promoted into the night shift role. Then just two weeks later, a day shift whistle chaser left and Jo Jo earned that spot. Another week went by and a millwright #1 position on the night shift opened up. Jo Jo again put in

his bid and was awarded the position. In just one month, he went from a trainee to a millwright #1. Jo Jo's advancement is a reflection of his readiness to take advantage of every

opportunity that came his way. "Come and work. Show it. Prove it. Actions speak louder than words. Do the work. Everything else will follow," explained Jo Jo.

In 2000, SPI's expansion into the state of Washington brought new opportunities. Jo Jo and his wife decided that the timing was right to make a move to help build the new SPI mill in Aberdeen. Jo Jo really wanted to learn how to build a mill from the ground up. His reputation for working well with everyone and truly being a team player made him a welcome addition to the Aberdeen team. For the next 16 years, Jo Jo worked as a millwright #1 at SPI Aberdeen before lending his experience to the SPI Shelton crew in 2016. Jo Jo shared, "I have no plan for retirement. My body will tell me when I'm done. I haven't slowed down at all since day one."

Keeping with the family tradition, Jo Jo's brother, Fili Toeleiu, joined the SPI family in 2010. Fili operates a loader at the Aberdeen mill. Jo Jo and his wife still live in the home they bought in Aberdeen and both are very active in the community. All three of their children were awarded Sierra Pacific Foundation scholarships. Jo Jo did not finish high school but all three of his children have enrolled in college and the pride he feels for them is unmistakable. "I have supported my entire family on my job. I just received my 20-year gold watch. I've never had such a fancy thing like that. I appreciate that so much," explained Jo Jo.

Jo Jo will be the first to tell you how much he appreciates the chances he's been given to learn at Sierra Pacific. In turn, we appreciate learning how far hard work and commitment can take all of us through Jo Jo's story.
